Dead swans have been found in the Fishbourne, Thorney and Bosham Channels and birds collected for analysis have since been confirmed to have been infected.


2 dead terns have been removed from the Pond recently and disposed of according to government guidelines at www.gov.uk/guidance/report-dead-wild-birds.

Antisocial Behaviour







Graffitti on the Mill wall – August 2022

It all escalated after a fire was deliberately lit by 2 young boys on 1st August on the west bank footpath. The fire began to spread quickly but was swiftly put out by local residents, including the Manager of the Raglan pub.

During the hot summer weather, there was much swimming and jumping in the Pond itself, with climbing on the tidal beam, gates and footbridge. The level of antisocial behaviour and litter was worse than anyone can remember, with particular impact on Slipper Mill residents (who have had stones thrown at them on numerous occasions) and boat owners who have had their boats damaged. This culminated on the evening of Monday 8th August with graffiti on the notice board, mill walls and footbridge.

The Trustees made the decision to open the tidal gates and to drain the Pond in order to limit the time available for anyone to swim in the Pond. As the river levels were very low upstream, it was then decided to use the sluice gate instead of the tidal gates which meant that there was still some water left in the Pond at low tides.

Draining the Pond did reduce the number of young people hanging out by the footbridge but antisocial behaviour continued to flare up, and local residents (and Police) are keen to have CCTV, which is something that we are investigating. We have also set up a local whatsapp group to communicate on these kinds of issues.

The problem of antisocial behaviour has been throughout the Harbour so is a community (not just an SMPPA) issue. The feeling is that Police are overwhelmed with calls, so occurrences have also been logged online via the West Sussex police website, with the Police visiting from time to time.

Sussex Local Wildlife Site "LWS" – status retained

After the Sussex Wildlife Trust surveyed the Pond in 2021, we are very pleased to say that the LWS Technical Panel reaffirmed the Pond's status as a Local Wildlife Site (LWS) in August 2022. The Southbourne local planning authority has been notified of the decision so that they can take account of it in implementing Local Plan policies.

A small team (Jim Hailstone, Rob Turner and Fraser Dibden) cut the grasses in early October followed by a full work party on Saturday 8th, to collect and bag the arisings. Four trailer-loads were taken away for recycling.

The Buddleia by the caravan park was removed – it needed a second work party of six people, and another two trailer loads. A mix of indigenous light "hedging" was planted instead in November (see "Planting" on page 7).

Graffiti was removed from the footbridge and walls as far as possible. New Perspex was purchased to replace that in the information board that had been damaged by graffiti.

Another rotten footbridge upright post was replaced by a group of volunteers (the second one this year). Concrete posts were placed on the verges on the southeast bank to prevent parking there.

Delicious home-made cakes, biscuits and refreshments were hosted by Susan & Fraser Dibden and were very welcome at the end of the session. Thankyou to everyone who contributed so much on the day.

Tidal Gates – Maintenance & Monitoring

In late November, while the Pond was drained, Jim Hailstone and Fraser Dibden spent several hours removing a large amount of growth from the gates using a jet wash and sharp scrapers.

Jim inspected the tidal gates & side posts using a bradawl, and concluded that they all appeared sound and not in need of renewal. The leakage around the tidal gates is now easier to detect after encrustation removal, and appears to be mainly between the corner posts and the walls. We are investigating if it is possible to fill these gaps.

Chequers Quay - Sea Club Rush Planting

The water around Chequers Quay appears to be getting shallower and silting up. Following comments from residents about the associated smell, it was agreed to plant Sea Club Rush (which is non-invasive) in two corners adjacent to the development.

Dave Gattrell from Peter Pond very kindly offered his expert advice and worked hard with Jim Hailstone, Rob Turner and Jo Greenfield in 2 sessions to do 2 areas of planting.

This was done by digging up sections of club rush in Peters Pond (see top photo) and wheel-barrowing them over the road, and "planting" them directly in the silt. The work has received favourable comments from residents and passers-by. It is hoped that the rushes will thrive.

Following the removal of the tired and overgrown Buddleia by the caravan park, Sharon Corbett and Rod Aitken planted around 85 saplings made up of hawthorn, blackthorn, hazel, crab apple, elder and wild cherry.

As native species, these light hedging plants will be far more suitable to encourage and shelter wildlife along the Pond banks.

Thank you to you both for your hard work. We shall enjoy watching the plants grow.

Peter Archer - former Committee Member - in memory

Peter Archer, who used to live in Harbour Way, has very sadly passed away recently. In the early 2000s there were many problems with the west bank which required frequent emergency repairs. Peter and other Committee Members worked tirelessly with Nick Madina on fundraising for the bank repairs and Peter was instrumental in "making them happen".

This culminated in a serious rebuild of the bank in 2011, when £75,000 was raised from grants (the bulk of it funnily enough from the EU), a major achievement after around 8 years of hard work. Peter also worked with the Environment Agency to help their understanding on how the River Ems works, as well as helping Nick make the current bird rafts. We are very grateful for his huge contribution over the years.




New Members are very welcome. If you know of anyone who is interested in joining us or is new to the area, please let us know, or pass our details on to them.


We are also looking for people or organisations to do Wildlife Monitoring / Studies.


