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It seems a long time ago now, but we had another fabulous dinner at Emsworth Sailing Club on 27<sup>th</sup> November (see page 4). We are continuing to chain back the tidal gates for longer periods over the winter period, so that the Pond becomes fully tidal for a week a month. Apart from being of help to the work done by Dave Gattrell at Peter Pond, we now know that this is assists with fish spawning, particularly for trout who swim in from the sea and go upstream. This is at the request of Sarah Hughes, the Chalk Streams Resilience Officer for the Western

Sussex Rivers Trust (project funded by Chichester District Council for the River Ems Restoration Project - see page 6).

The autumn work party in October (see below) took place on a beautiful day, with more than 20 of you helping. We were also very lucky with the weather for the Summer Party in July (page 7) which was very well attended.

The next event is the **AGM which will be on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> March at 7.00pm.** We do hope you will join us.

We had a beautiful day for clearing the banks in October with over 20 volunteers, and a

wonderful array of refreshments afterwards, hosted by Susan & Fraser Dibden. Jim Hailstone and his team of Slipper Road helpers (Rob Turner, Fraser Dibden, Tim Hollins, Leigh Charlton, Keith Nicholls and Clive Johnson) had strimmed the banks in the run-up to the day, so the main job was to collect the arisings. This year a skip was brought in at short notice which considerably reduced the bagging and trailer process — needing one tip run only. Jonathan Stamper also bravely retrieved some larger items of miscellaneous rubbish from the Pond (see photos overleaf).

Thankyou to everyone who helped out on the day and in the days before.

We have decided that once a year for strimming is no longer sufficient as there has been a lot of growth due to higher amounts of rainfall in the last couple of years. It is proposed to go back to twice per year in July & October. A contractor proposal is to use a flail mulcher which will mean that there is no need for raking/bagging/removal. The Trustees have agreed to trial this for both July and October bank cuts, and review again at the end of the year. Although more expensive than the DIY approach we have used for many years, it will considerably reduce the physical work (and time) for the volunteers.

We will be monitoring the growth of hemlock, ragwort and cow parsley, and are hoping to quickly tackle them as they appear in the spring so that they do not take over the banks.

There is a workparty whatsapp group for regular helpers, and there are a wide variety of tasks that need doing by small specialist groups – please get in touch if you would be interested in helping out and would like to join the whatsapp group. ### Tidal Gates chained back - the Chalk Stream Resilience Project

You may have noticed that we have recently been chaining the gates back for longer periods over the winter months. Historically, the main reasons for chaining them back were to enable us to carry out work around our own Pond, and also at Peter Pond to the north, where Dave Gattrell spends most weekends clearing and managing the vegetation. Chaining back the gates so that the pond becomes tidal (particularly when there are high river flows) helps clear silt, particularly from Peter Pond.

# The Chalk Stream Resilience project <a href="https://wsrt.org.uk/about/our-projects/chalk-stream-resilience">https://wsrt.org.uk/about/our-projects/chalk-stream-resilience</a>

is focused on improving water quality, making the streams more resilient to high and low flows, and enabling habitats and species to thrive.

One of the planned actions is to install fish and eel passes around the barriers on the River Ems so that they can more easily swim upstream to spawn.

However, we have recently been asked to leave the gates open for longer during the winter, in order to encourage the fish (primarily trout) to spawn upstream; these fish spawn from November to February. This request comes from the Western Sussex Rivers Trust (Chalk Stream Resilience Project Officer Sarah Hughes). This project is working to restore 3 precious and globally unique chalk rivers - the Ems, Hambrook and Lavant. Slipper Mill Pond is a vital part of the River Ems Wildlife Corridor which runs from Hermitage to Westbourne.

By having the tidal gates open for longer, there is much more time and opportunity for the fish, particularly trout and eels, to swim from the sea into the Pond, and from there make their way up the River Ems to spawn. Research carried out elsewhere by a company called FishTek found that one gate kept open for just 25 minutes longer resulted in a ten-fold increase in the number of elvers moving upstream through a tidal gate.


We are, again, particularly grateful to Simon Dwyer and Claire Starling for providing us with such a beautiful venue. Come along to the 2025 summer party!




